



The Journey Continues - Do Not Stop Learning

This study is presented from the perspective that the Bible is the Word of God. Therefore, it is authoritative and without error.

(2 Timothy 3:16-17; 2 Peter 1:20-21)



Whether you are reading one verse, a chapter, or a whole book at one time, you need to remember the following:

- > Nothing in the Bible is wasted or insignificant
- > These God inspired truths are for our benefit
- ➢ God did not want us to be ignorant of His word

As you open the Bible, consider these 3 basic study tools:

- Observation Comprehension of what is read is important. While memorizing scripture is helpful, we must be confident of what is being communicated to us. Was it literal, figurative, historical, prophetic, or a combination? *Remember, there is probably more truths for you to learn then what you first noticed.*
- Interpretation The original meaning and purpose can be known in God's perfect timing (John 16:13). Wrong assumptions about the meaning of individual words can drastically change the context of scripture. Correct doctrine will be supported in other passages. Remember, words have a way of evolving as the culture changes.
- Application How can what is read apply to me personally today, or in the future? How can it help me in sharing the Gospel and/or discipling others? How can it help me rightly place other scriptures in proper context? How can it help me be more confident in my faith? *Remember, the Word is to be lived out and not just read.*

Topical Study

This approach is particularly helpful in gaining biblical understanding that applies to a need in your life, your family, or those around you; such as truths pertaining to marriage, self-control, parent-child relationships, managing finances, healing, or evangelicalism.

Just be sure that you are reading them in their proper context so as not to pick out a single scripture and miss the ultimate teaching that God desired.

Remember, as you gain more and more knowledge on a particular topic, you will also gain faith in God's perfect plan for each area of your life (Romans 10:17).

- > Hebrews 11 is a great place to start studying the topic of Faith
- Malachi 3 is a great place to start studying the topic of Tithing
- > Matthew 13 is a great place to start studying the topic of Parables
- Isaiah 53 is a great place to start studying the topic of Suffering
- Mark 5 is a great place to start studying the topic of Deliverance

Supernatural Benefits

Every Christian has to have their mind renewed (*Romans 12:1-2*). This retraining is essential for us to experience the preordained benefits provided through the God-breathed scripture as described by the Apostle in 2 Timothy 3:16-17. *Remember, without our thought life being made new it will be impossible for us to fully know God's perfect will for our life.*

- > The Word is profitable We are made better because of it
- > The Word instructs us We are taught by the perfect Teacher
- > The Word corrects us We are redirected from self-inflicted harm
- > The Word trains us We are transformed into the likeness of our Teacher
- > The Word prepares us We are able to fulfill Teacher's purpose

Seeking - Knocking - Asking

Good intentions do not bring about change, neither will it drive us to be diligent in our pursuit of Godly wisdom. If we are truly hungry for the things of God, it will be displayed in our normal daily life (*Deuteronomy 6:4-6*). *Remember, our Lord and Savior desires for us to know Him, that is why He wants us to seek out His truth* (*Proverbs 4:7*).

- What attributes of God's character did I see revealed? Remember, if we are going to "put on" the mind of Christ (*Philippians 2:5*), we will have to search out the character traits of the One who created you in His image.
- > Did the scripture directly point to different persons of the Trinity (Father, Son, Holy Spirit)?
- Did the scripture explain the need for salvation?
- > Did the scripture explain the result of not accepting Jesus as Lord and Savior?
- > Did the scripture explain the difference between the Spirit and the flesh (Galatians 5:16-26)?
- ▶ How did the scripture help put other biblical passages in proper context?
- ▶ What truths caused you to reflect on different aspects of your current lifestyle?
- ▶ What truths encouraged you to love God and others more perfectly?
- > Did the passage highlight sin that today's culture accepts?
- > Who was the passage originally written to?
- > What was the historic setting of the passage?
- > Who was the main character in the passage?
- > Did the passage appear to speak of past, present, or future events?
- Did the passage refer to other biblical characters, places, or events?
- > Are there certain words, people, and places that you need to research?
- > Are there topics and stories that made you uncomfortable? Why?
- > How can you incorporate the passage in your prayer time?

Letting Go

One of the hardest steps in the learning process, is unlearning facts and habits that are not helpful or Godly. Many believers are unwilling to let go of previously held beliefs, even when faced with a plain understanding of a biblical truth. The notion that much of their past knowledge or that their political world view has been contrary to the Word, is more than some can accept.

We must recognize that we all come from a place of corrupt thinking due to sin; and just because we have long adopted a particular mind set through our upbringing, an erroneous view of God, or being immersed in a certain lifestyle doesn't mean we are correct. *Remember, each of us must allow the living and powerful Word to humble us so that any needed repentance can turn us from the fleshly thought life that brought us so much confusion and difficulty (Hebrews 4:12).*

Pitfalls In Bible Study

Christ wants us to experience His full provision (*John 10:10*); yet many believers live an uninspired defeated life. When we learn to consistently engage with the holy Word of the Lord, we are better able to experience His presence in our life (*John 1:1*); but we must do so internationally, or we will miss the blessing. *Remember, our flesh faces many temptations to distract us from a super-natural understanding of our Creator.*

- Speed Reading (without comprehension we cannot gain wisdom)
- Distracted Study (without focus we cannot discern the still small voice)
- > Familiarity (without humility we cannot expect to receive more)
- > Delayed Application (*without obedience we cannot fully experience the truth*)
- Giving Up (without perseverance we cannot expect to grow)
- Silence (without prayer we cannot speak to the Author of the Book)

Lesson 1 – Discovering The One True God

Christianity is not a religion, it is a relationship. This study is designed to help us better understand the One in whom we have been called to abide eternally. The deeper our understanding of the characteristics and attributes of God, the deeper our relationship becomes. He already knows us, and He wants us to know Him.

Understanding and believing the essentials of biblical truth is crucial to living in a confident and abiding faith. These foundational truths are also vital to the believer when it comes to their awareness and knowledge of the One true God.

The following are a few topics that people struggle to know and accept:

- Salvation by grace not works
- > The death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus
- Creation is an intentional act
- Monotheism as opposed to polytheism, agnosticism, atheism, or pantheism
- ➤ Deity of Jesus
- ➤ Humanity of Jesus
- ➤ Only one path to heaven
- ➤ Tri-unity of God
- ➢ Faith, Hope, and Love
- > The Gospel message of "whosoever"
- All are born into sin and depravity
- Eternity, Holiness, and Judgement
- ➤ Life after death
- Monotheism There is only <u>1</u> God (Psalm 86:10; Isaiah 43:10, 11; James 2:19)
 - Since there is only one true God, we are warned about honoring anyone or anything in a place of greater importance (Exodus 20:3-5, 34:14; Colossians 3:1-6)

Why is it important to know and believe that there is only one God?

- Trinity God is one in essence and three in Person (Matthew 28:19; Ephesians 4:4-7).
 - > The Father sent the Son (John 3:16)
 - > The Father and the Son sent the Holy Spirit (John 14:26; Acts 2:33)
 - > The Holy Spirit empowers and reveals truth (John16:8-13; Romans 8:11)

Each member of the Trinity is a distinct person and involved in our lives.

The tri-unity of God demonstrates that God is eternally loving and relational. Before humankind was created, God lived and loved eternally in community with Himself (Genesis 1:26-27). The tri-unity of God makes salvation possible. The Father pours out His wrath against sin on the Son, the Son propitiates the wrath by providing atonement because He is both God and man, and the Spirit applies that salvation to us through His indwelling and regenerating presence.

Though the doctrine of a Triune God can be difficult to grasp, what aspects of the Trinity bring you the most comfort in your relationship with God?

- The Person of Jesus Christ Jesus is God's Son (John 3:16; 1 John 4:15)
 - > Jesus Christ is God in the flesh (John 1:1, 14; Philippians 2:5-8)
 - Jesus Christ is the image of God (Colossians 1:15; Hebrews 1:1-3)
 - Jesus Christ is not an angel (Hebrews 1:4-9)
 - > Jesus Christ is the object of our faith (Hebrews 1:2, 11:6, 12:2)
 - Jesus Christ intercedes for us (1 Timothy 2:5; Hebrews 7:25)
 - Jesus Christ was born of a virgin (Isaiah 7:14; Matthew 1:18-25)
 - > Jesus Christ is the only way to be saved (John 14:6; Acts 4:12)
 - Jesus Christ was crucified and resurrected (1 Corinthians 15:3-4, 14, 17)
 - Jesus Christ is Lord and King forever (Revelation 1:8, 19:16, 22:13)
 - Jesus Christ is our propitiation (1 John 2:2, 4:10; Romans 3:25)
 - Jesus Christ died for you (Romans 5:8; Hebrews 9:11-28)
 - Which one of these characteristics stood out the most to you and why?
- God the Holy Spirit Giver of Spiritual Gifts (1 Corinthians 12:7-11)
 - Produces the fruit of righteousness (Galatians 5:16-25)
 - Renews us at salvation (Titus 3:4-6)
 - Intercedes for us (Romans 8:26)
 - Can call you out for service (Acts 13:2)
 - ▶ Is able to change circumstances (Acts 16:6-7)

Remember, the Holy Spirit is a personal being just as God the Father and God the Son. God the Holy Spirit is active in creation, conviction, prayer, and the regeneration of the redeemed.

One of the greatest blessings that Christians receive is the development of righteous character through the indwelling of God the Holy Spirit. All believers are provided everything needed for godliness as the Holy Spirit guides, comforts, and convicts (2 Peter 1:1-11). The closer our relationship is with the Father, the more we are influenced by His holy character, and the less likely we are to stumble along the way. The more God increases in our life, the less of us gets in the way (John 3:30). Just as our bodies benefit from healthy supplements, so does our spirit.

THE FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

Lesson 2 – The Power of Salvation

This study is essential to the understanding of sin, salvation, and our need to be forgiven and made right in the eyes of God through Jesus. All relationships have a beginning - and salvation is the beginning for the believer.

- Sin Sin is a transgression of God's law *(missing the mark)* (1 John 3:4)
 - All have sinned (Romans 3:23)
 - Sin brings death (Romans 6:23)
 - Sin separates us from God (Isaiah 59:1-2; Genesis 3:23-24)
 - Sin is the reason that all must be saved (1 John 1:5-10; John 3:16-21)
 - ✤ Who determines the standard for what gets classified as sin?
 - Can comparing our sin to the sin of others diminish the seriousness of all sin?
- Salvation is a gift God's love brings grace and mercy (John 3:17; Ephesians 2:8)
 - God draws us (John 6:44)
 - God wants you to be saved (1 Timothy 2:4; 2 Peter 3:9)

Have you ever struggled with the value of things that are free?

- Salvation is not of works We are unable to save our self (Ephesians 2:9)
 - No one can be declared righteous on their own (Romans 3:20; Galatians 3:11)
 - No one's good can outweigh their bad (2 Timothy 1:9; Titus 3:5)

* Do good works have any value?

- Salvation is conditional upon faith Faith pleases God (Hebrews 11:6)
 - Salvation comes by grace through faith (Ephesians 2:8)
 - Faith is a requirement until the end (Matthew 7:21-23; Hebrews 6:4-6, 10:26-39)
 - **What does "shipwrecking" your faith mean to you?** (1 Timothy 1:18-20)
- Salvation brings a change We are given a new nature (2 Corinthians 5:17)

 - Being born-again implies a transformation, yet many professing Christians seem to be living the same kind of life they did before salvation. What do you see as the problem when the believer is not growing spiritually and they are still tied to their old lifestyle?

Many struggle to make peace with their past, but if Jesus is able to deal with the sin of the whole world, He is able to completely forgive your past as well.

<u>Lesson 3 – Experiencing God Part 1</u>

• Experiencing God Through Prayer



Conviction or Conversion

Jesus said, "Unless you are converted and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven" (*Matt. 18:3*). Jesus is clear that if a person of this world is to be accepted into the kingdom of heaven, they must be converted (*born-again John 3:3*). In the biblical sense, conversion means a turning—a spiritual turning away from sin in repentance and to Christ in faith. It is a dramatic turning away from one path in order to pursue an entirely new one. It involves turning one's back to the system of the world, anti-God values, and self-righteousness. This turning leads to a radical transformation through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit (*2 Corinthians 5:7, 17-21*).

True repentance is visible, since a change of heart will lead to a change in actions.

Part 1 - Joy In Trials

1. Trials prove our testimony – It is easy for the Christian to praise God when things go our way; but God must be proclaimed even when we are in the valley (1 Peter 1:6; 2 Timothy 2:8-10; Isaiah 25:1-5; Hebrews 4:14-16).

How can those around us be encouraged by our faithfulness in difficult times?

2. Trials prove us – God uses difficulty in this life to strengthen our resolve, and to make our faith complete (James 1:2-4; Romans 5:3; Matthew 5:12). *How can difficult times in your life give you confidence in your faith?*

3. Trials prove God's faithfulness – The dark and painful times of life, are great opportunities to experience the peaceful majesty of God's unfailing love (2 Timothy 2:13; Psalm 18:1-6, 16-19, 25-29, 46-50; 1 Corinthians 10:13; Jeremiah 29:11-13).

How can difficult times teach us more about the promises of God?

Part 2 - Satisfaction In God's Plan

1. Prepared for trouble – Many Christians are caught off guard by heartache and disappointment, as if it was not part of God's plan (John 16:33; 1 Peter 4:12; Psalm 11:5; 2 Timothy 3:12).

How can being prepared for trouble make the process easier when it comes?

2. Prepared for service in suffering – The Bible teaches that we are to persevere - meaning that even when life is not pleasing, we continue to serve God (1 Peter 4:19; Galatians 6:9; Psalm 144:1-2)

Do you think you could continue serving God, if everything fell apart? Why?

3. Prepared for God's best in others – Sometimes our difficulty and suffering is what is needed for someone else to see God's glory. Most everyone enjoys an inspirational story, but most of us do not want to serve as that inspiration. While the Book of Job brings great comfort, we must not forget that he had to suffer deeply (Job 1:13-21, 2:7-9; 2 Corinthians 11:18-12:10) *We are told in Philippians 2:5 to put on the mind of Christ. How difficult do you believe it is to suffer on behalf of another person?*



Encouragement To Persevere

Satan patrols the earth like a roaring lion looking for the weak and the stragglers - for they are the easiest prey to devour. His mission is to kill, steal, and destroy (*John 10:9-10; 1 Peter 5:6-9*). He seeks to kill our motivation; to steal our joy; and to destroy our faith; and the easiest way to accomplish this is to convince us that we are helpless sinners. Satan will point to our our failures and our past in hopes that we give up; but if you have placed your faith in Jesus Christ as your Lord and Savior, you must quit listening to the lies of the devil, and start believing in the promises of God!

Being a disciple of Christ is a life-long learning event where some days don't seem as victorious as others; yet Jesus said He would be with us always and that He is committed to us unto the end (*Matthew 28:16-20; Philippians 1:6*).

As a born-again believer you are called to be a disciple and to be a disciple maker. You can do this because it is Jesus working in and through you. So congratulations on completing this study and be diligent to pursue deeper biblical truth that will allow your relationship with an Almighty God to grow closer everyday!

The Greek term for "disciple" in the New Testament is *mathetes*, which basically means "student" or "learner." But a disciple is also a "follower," someone who adheres completely to the teachings of another, making them his rule of life and conduct. The Pharisees prided themselves in being disciples of Moses (*John 9:28*). Jesus' followers were called "disciples" long before they were ever called "Christians." Their discipleship began with Jesus' call and required them to exercise their will to follow Him (*Matthew 9:9*).

A true Christian disciple is a believer in Christ and possesses new life through the indwelling Holy Spirit. Because he loves Christ, a Christian will also be an obedient disciple *(John 14:15)*. Paul describes the reality of being a Christian disciple: "I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me" *(Galatians 2:20)*.
